The house structure, in particular, will underpin what we stand for: the individual care for each student and

their development (the key principle being that the Head of House stays with the student throughout their growing years); and the breadth of opportunity. I know that it will be a huge success.

The green shoots of spring are certainly more than echoed in all the exciting developments here at King's.

## A huge crop of university offers for **Upper Sixth students**



UPPER SIXTH FORMERS are celebrating a huge crop of university offers this year after lots of work in completing applications and rounds of gruelling interviews. As they now head towards their A Level final exams next term, students have received offers for 93% of their chosen universities, of which 83% were from the top Russell Group universities.

The Russell Group universities represent 24 of the UK's top higher education institutions and promote excellent teaching and research. You'll find them all at the top of the UK rankings, as well as some global league tables.

The Russell Group also includes Oxford and Cambridge and four Sixth Formers have received offers from these top two UK universities: Rebecca Hatton (U6HJ) has received an offer to study Human, Social and Political Sciences at Downing College, Cambridge; Mathew Oliver (2016 leaver) has received an offer for Clare College, Cambridge to read Mathematics and Harriet Fisher (2016 leaver) received an offer from King's College Cambridge to study Theology, Religion and Philosophy of Religion. Harriet has recently continued her long association with drama at King's by acting as Deputy Director in *Little Shop of Horrors* during her gap year. Jack Hodgkinson (U6HJ) has received an offer to read Economics and Management at St Peter's College, Oxford, the most competitive course in the country.

Offers for Medicine have been received by: Reya Patil (U6SD), Anna Plunkett (U6JR), Eleri Reece-Jones (U6NH) and Gunchit Sharma (U6HJ); and Amelia Jones (U6KS) has received an offer for Dentistry. Not all Medicine offers have been received yet and several students are still waiting to hear at this stage.

We wish all our Sixth Formers good luck with their final A Level exams in their quest to fulfil the conditions of their offers.

# Answering maths challenges at the **UKMT Regional Finals**

CONGRATULATIONS to our four pupils who recently went to Birkenhead School to participate in the Regional Final of the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Team Maths Competition – a competition testing mathematical, communication and teamwork skills.

Our team of Avinandan Sengupta (ShAD), Aryan Agarwal (ShCM), Mollie Ramsey (3JJ) and Riyaan Yesudian (3JJ) competed against nineteen other schools and colleges from the area in four challenging rounds. Despite tough competition we did really well and were placed third overall.

# Physics students explore the world of CERN

A NUMBER OF Upper Sixth physics students visited CERN (the European organisation for nuclear research).

The students got inside CERN Control, seeing accelerators and the SM18 complex – a world-leading test bed for magnets and instrumentation at low temperatures and high currents.

They also visited the ISOLDE facility (a world-leading laboratory for the studies of radioactive nuclei) and the Medicis facility (a ground-breaking laboratory producing radio isotopes used for medical applications). Making the most of their time there, they managed to take in a visit to The United Nations Office in Geneva. What a trip!





# Little Shop of Horrors a blooming success...

### Cult classic is a big success on stage



Remembering the fallen of the Great War

TWENTY FORMER PUPILS lost their lives in the Great War during 1917 – more than in 1914, 1915 and 1916 put together. March 26th 1917 was the blackest day of the entire war, with three men lost. Royal Welsh Fusilier, Second Lieutenant Robert Parry (OKS 1908-15), and two men in the Cheshires, Lieutenant Norman Roe Foster (OKS 1902-07) and Second Lieutenant John Oscar Laybourne (1899-1908) all died that day.

At 20, Parry, the son of a Chester schoolmaster, was the youngest of the three. "A bright, intelligent and likeable fellow" who "showed great promise from boyhood." At King's, he distinguished himself in athletics and was captain of both the cricket and football elevens. Foster and Laybourne, both a little older than Parry, were killed in the same action. Foster hailed from Burnley but lived in Hoole while he was at King's

and, like Parry, captained the school football elevens. Laybourne was the son of the local Chief Constable and there is a stained glass window memorial to him in Chester Cathedral: "a noble life sacrificed for the future welfare of humanity."

It was not in the trenches of France or Belgium that they died but in the fog-covered deserts of Gaza, a reminder that this was truly a world war. Nor did they die fighting the Germans, but their allies, the Ottoman Turks. All are now buried in Gaza CWGC War Cemetery in Israel, which has repeatedly suffered war damage in recent years, making one wonder whether their lives really were laid down "for the future welfare of humanity."

LAST TERM we took part in the regional Geographical Association Worldwise Quiz, held at Chester University.

There were 20 other teams from local schools, and 8 tough rounds – ranging from simple topics such as recognising countries by their outlines, to more advanced rounds where pupils had to answer questions about geographical investigation techniques.

Our Shells Team were victorious, beating all other 20 teams, scoring an impressive 92/102.

### Discovering Berlin's historical past and present

THIRTY SIXTH FORM STUDENTS couldn't conceal their excitement at the prospect of visiting Berlin.

At the centre of European and world affairs for much of the past century, the city offers a cultural and historical experience second to none.

Berlin's history is often dark and problematic, yet this is all the more reason to visit. The Holocaust Memorial, the German Historical Museum and the Memoires of a German Nation exhibition were challenging and thought-provoking in equal measure.

Guided tours of the Palace of Tears and the Bundestag, and a visit to the British Embassy hosted by one of the military attachés, were also greatly enjoyed.

Nothing, however, could compete with Dennis, the local guide, for a three-and-a-half hour walking tour of central Berlin. All complaint about the length of the walking tour quickly evaporated

as he enthralled the students with his informative, funny and poignant tales.

Potsdam's eighteenth-century elegance provided a fitting backdrop for reflection on the last afternoon and, yes, another walk.

A busy four days passed all too quickly and it's safe to say that, if this was the first time in Berlin for some students, it certainly won't be their last.

# First MFL Film Night focusses on Luc Besson LAST TERM saw the first Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) Film Night and a gathering of Sixth Form students in the Vanbrugh Theatre to watch something a bit different and think about cinematography and film analysis. Anthony Ramsey, former King's student and current languages undergraduate, kindly gave a very interesting and informative speech on the career of French director Luc Besson and the construction and interpretation of gender in his works. Students and staff then enjoyed his fantastical love story, Angel-A, about a fallen angel and her relationship with a troubled petty crook with a beautifully-shot, black and white Paris as the setting. Then followed a short discussion session where students could share their ideas about the film and we will return to this in A Level lessons later in the year.

# Pioneering Independent Learning Projects get off to a great start





THIRD YEAR PUPILS have been completing their Independent Learning Projects this term, a pioneering King's initiative introduced last year.

Pupils chose their own exciting research areas and decided how to present their project. Over one hundred projects were completed including scale models, paintings, essays, books, diaries and displays which were showcased on the presentation evening to parents, staff and pupils. It is impossible to name every project but a flavour of the diversity included: the history of ballet; the electromagnetic train; the effect of a tsunami; and sunset photography.



Other projects included: how people make their homes more energy efficient; Banksy and street art; and a musical interpretation of "Black Lives Matter."

It is ground-breaking to undertake projects like these so early in pupils' careers; it allows them to delve into an area they find fascinating and follow wherever it takes them. This way of working really is learning for pleasure. It also teaches pupils valuable skills such as time and project management, discerning research skills, self-reflection and presentation skills – vital life skills for their futures.



# Geography rocks!

THE GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT recently welcomed Professor Dan Faulkner of Liverpool University to talk about his research on geological fault

lines. Most A Level geographers were present along with some particularly keen Fourth and Fifth Formers.

Professor Faulkner talked about the research he has been involved in and in particular, talked students through an incredible \$30m project which involved drilling cores across the San Andreas Fault, many kilometres into

the earth's crust. He even brought some highly valuable samples with him which the students were able to handle.

The students thoroughly enjoyed his presentation and would like to thank Professor Faulkner for his time.


## Book Award creates a big buzz

Following the 'Inspiring Minds Science' event, we will host an exclusive science networking and fundraising dinner at King's for the 'who's who' of science in the North West.


We'll be fundraising for science bursaries at King's and championing investment in science in our region. We're inviting the local scientific community as well as our alumni, parents and interested charitable trusts.

# Athletes pick up an impressive haul of medals

JAVELIN, JUMPING, BOUNCING AND BALANCING were just some of the activities undertaken when 31 pupils represented King's at the Association of Junior Independent Schools Indoor Athletics Competition at Robin Park, Wigan.

Athletes displayed excellent technique and skill, combined with exemplary behaviour throughout. After a thoroughly enjoyable day, King's came home with an impressive haul of medals, including 7 gold, 11 silver and 6 bronze medals.



### Rowers put in performances to be proud of



IN DECEMBER, the Wycliffe Small Boats Head saw the trio of Senior Boys coxed fours placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd in the open men's category and crowned the fastest four of the division. The J15 boys performed commendably to capture a bronze medal.

Fair water and no wind greeted over 120 pupils for the annual Pudding Races. The final saw 'Santa' defeat 'Tinsel' by one boat length, with prizes being kindly presented by the Deputy Mayor of Chester. The day also saw two new boats christened. A coxless four shell was named after Maud Moir (OKS 2015) in recognition of her achievements while rowing at the school, as well as more recently at university. The second boat was named after Harry Brightmore (OKS 2012) in recognition of his achievements at school and at university culminating in him winning the Temple Cup at Henley Royal Regatta.

In February, 72 rowers made the journey to Wycliffe. Racing was fiercely competitive with many of our rivals present. The J14 boys were in mixed octuples and the two boats raced well to finish a mere 0.3 seconds apart. The two J14 girls' octuples also raced extremely well with one of the boats taking the overall win for the event. Also victorious were the J15 boys who won the J15 VIIIs pennant over Shrewsbury School. The Senior Girls VIII dominated the Women's Junior VIIIs winning by 30 seconds and, in doing so, set the fastest women's time of the day along with a new course record. This was a significant win for us as the crew included two J15 girls and an athlete who had never held an oar until they arrived at King's 5 months ago!



The Senior Girls' coxed four rounded off an excellent day of racing with a win in the Under 18 coxed fours event, promising much for the months and years ahead in such a young 'Senior' squad.

February half-term saw the Senior Boys' VIII compete at The Head of the Trent in Nottingham. The event included some of the fastest VIIIs in the country including the Cambridge University and Goldie Boat Race crews. We dealt well with the tricky conditions, coming 2nd in the J18 8+ event. The afternoon was a great opportunity for the VIII to split into two coxed fours. One crew placed 4th in their Senior event and their crew-mates won the J18, 4+ event.

All our athletes should be proud of their performances on the water so far this year and these positive results will fuel a renewed vigour in training as we move towards the summer racing season.
