One of our best ever years for top university places!

OUR SIXTH FORM STUDENTS have been congratulated for their hard work and determination after receiving offers for highly competitive courses at the country's most prestigious universities.

As of 6 March, 60% of the students have all five offers and 30% have four offers from their preferred universities. Eight students have been offered places to study at either the University of Oxford or the University of Cambridge.

Several have received offers for a range of fiercely competitive courses across Russell Group universities including Medicine, Veterinary Science, Dentistry, Economics, Chemistry and History, many of which have an average of 12 applicants per place. Of particular note is the offer of four places to study Economics at London School of Economics.

This ranks as one of King's best years for students gaining places at top universities.

Head of Sixth Form Josh Carter said, "We are hugely proud of all of the Upper Sixth as they continue to achieve interviews and offers for university application in 2018. Whilst the increasingly competitive world of Oxbridge gains the headlines it is hugely important to recognise that all our students make the right decisions for themselves and each one is ambitious in this respect."

Students star at STEM Science & Technology national challenge

TWO TALENTED PUPILS claimed top spot in a national STEM competition, recently held at Manchester University.

Freya Walsh (4FOX) and Mansi Gupta (4FOX) joined two pupils from Merchant Taylors' School to win the North West Science and Technology Final, organised by MCS Projects Ltd.

Last summer, a group of our current Fourth Year students attended the regional stage of the competition, at which Freya and Mansi were paired with two students from Upton School. Their group went on to win the event. Unfortunately, the team members from Upton School were unable to attend the national final and the girls were asked to pair up with Merchant Taylors', for what proved to be a very successful day!

The task was to write a computer program for a robot to navigate a maze, followed by a presentation to all the regional finalists in the room, explaining what they had learned during the process.

Their robot was selected as the most successful and the delivery of their presentation was hugely impressive, with both pupils highlighting the importance of using failure as a way to develop and improve.

MCS Projects Ltd aims to raise the aspirations of young people by involving them in events which enrich their knowledge of science, technology and languages.

Headmaster Mr Hartley said: "We were very proud to receive the news that Freya and Mansi were crowned as winners of the STEM final. A commendable achievement and a real testament to the amount of work they put into the event."

Itsy's inspirational work for refugees makes a real impact



OUR FIRST HERALD EXCLUSIVE FEATURES Third Year pupil Itsogehna Oyedeji (3LES) and her inspirational work with the refugee crisis.

Itsogehna claims her interest in the refugee crisis was sparked by an enrichment presentation given by her geography teacher, Mrs Aldridge, in which she discussed the growing refugee crisis across Europe. The image of three young boys of similar age to Itsogehna and her classmates holding up a 'HELP' sign was the moment she was inspired to take personal action.

She began by contacting Asylum Link Merseyside, an organisation dedicated to assisting asylum seekers and refugees in Liverpool, and began to work in the charity's soup kitchens.

Wishing to further her voluntary work, Itsogehna approached local charity SHARE and met its co-founder Adam Dandy, whom she arranged to interview to gain further insight into their work with the homeless and displaced refugees.

She also spent a day conducting a survey at Cheshire Oaks Retail Park, where she filmed and questioned members of the public about their feelings towards asylum seekers and what they thought could be done on a practical level. Itsogehna's next step was to contact the United Nations Office to request an opportunity to visit during half-term

Having received no reply following a series of emails, she persevered by writing a handwritten letter and was subsequently invited to visit! This proved to be an incredible experience, allowing her to build relationships with members of the office and further develop her knowledge about refugees.

Inspired by all of her experiences, Istogehna will collate her work to display as part of the Independent Learning Project (ILP) scheme. The ILP carves out time in a busy curriculum to allow students to study something that they find fascinating in depth.



Exploring the home of advanced physics in Switzerland

THE PHYSICS DEPARTMENT recently led a trip for Upper Sixth students to CERN (the European Organisation for Nuclear Research) in Geneva, Switzerland, to complement their ongoing A Level studies


Every day, physicists and engineers at CERN probe the fundamental structure of the universe. They use the world's largest and most complex scientific instruments to study the basic constituents of matter.

The students' first day was spent exploring Geneva, before embarking on a journey through the Physics 'Holy Land'. The second day included an official tour around the CERN site, starting in the very

lecture theatre where the Higgs boson discovery was announced. They were also given the opportunity to visit the LEIR accelerator, the hydrogen canister and the Computing Centre.

The third day involved a visit to ISOLDE, a nuclear research facility that creates and studies superheavy radioactive nuclei. The final highlight of the trip was a visit to the IdeaSquare, an interesting side project that sees students from around the world get together to apply the physics discovered at CERN to real world problems. As a last treat on the way back to the airport, the students were given a whistle stop tour of the United Nations HQ, which proved to be an insightful end to an inspiring trip!









Past Masters of the suffragette movement

THREE LIKE-MINDED PUPILS impressed an invited audience with a presentation exploring the history of the suffragettes this term.

Lily Hodge (RmRA), Erin Heath (RmMW) and Imogen Brander (RmRA) researched the complex history of the movement after deciding to take part in Past Masters – a series of voluntary talks organised through the History Club. The talks take place fortnightly and are open to all Senior School pupils. Recent topics have included Hiroshima, the Battle of Britain and the rise and fall of Factory Records.

Lily said, "I was trying to think of something that had a massive impact on society and I immediately thought of the suffragette movement. We talked about the founder Emily Pankhurst and about Emily Wilding Davison, who threw herself under a horse. We discussed whether we thought that had been a deliberate act or if she was attempting just to draw attention to the movement."

The girls used a range of media to illustrate their presentation to an audience of teachers, Removes, Sixth Formers and their own teaching group.

Awesome Origami!

ALONG WITH MANY CLUBS AND SOCIETIES offered at King's, the Origami Club has proved very popular, particularly among Year 8 boys.

Witchborn author enchants pupil audience

FORMER PUPIL NICK BOWLING (OKS 2003) made a welcome return to King's to share the success of his new book: *Witchborn*.

Nick is an author, stand-up comic, musician and Latin teacher who now lives in London. After King's, he studied Classics and English at Oxford University, graduating in 2007. Nick went on to complete a Masters in Greek and Latin Language and Literature in 2010. Following his graduation from Oxford, Nick taught at Trinity School, Croydon.

Witchborn is Nick's debut novel; it took him five years to perfect, including several rewrites – the book was launched in late 2017.

During his visit to King's he spoke to our Senior School pupils, sharing with them an insight into his creative thought process whilst writing. This was followed by an exclusive book signing session, where pupils were able to purchase a signed copy of *Witchborn*.


475 brings King's history to life with brilliant production and performances






THIS DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARDS season has resulted in a busy year for our pupils, with more than 130 new pupils registered for the award, across all three levels.

We continue to work closely with our expedition providers at Get Outside the Classroom to ensure that pupils have a safe,

challenging and enjoyable expedition experience. To date, we have presented 33 Bronze and 20 Silver Awards in school as recognition of their achievements.

Twenty-two pupils successfully completed their Gold Award in 2017 and will receive their certificates at a presentation ceremony at St James' Palace, London, which will be attended by His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh.

Pupils participating in the Award continue to be involved in a wide range of activities, including music, photography, cooking, veterinary surgery assistants and sport. They also devote a significant amount of time volunteering with toddler/youth groups, centres for the elderly and numerous charities.

This year, we have run a very successful Gold Canoe trip on the rivers Dee and Severn. The 16 students also achieved the 1 Star Open Boat award in the process.

IN JANUARY, 66 CADETS travelled to an extremely chilly Nesscliffe Camp in Shropshire to undertake a weekend of weapons training.

The group consisted of approximately 45 new recruits and 21 enthusiastic older cadets who acted as assistant directing staff (ADS). They proved to be one of the swiftest groups of recruits in recent years to pick up the skills and, by dinner time, 30 cadets had already passed.

well against the challenging conditions.


Other background activities

Jonathan Ralphs is our problemsolving computing mastermind

A TALENTED SIXTH FORM STUDENT CAME SECOND in a nationwide computing challenge, held at the Department of Computer Science at Oxford University.



Jonathan Ralphs (U6) was placed second in his age group in the UK BEBRAS Computational Thinking Challenge in January.

A total of 5,174 students entered the first round of the Elite age group category (Years 12 & 13), and 43 top achieving students took part in the final at Oxford for the Elite age group. Jonathan was presented with his certificate at a prizegiving ceremony at Hertford College.

The UK BEBRAS Computational Thinking Challenge, supported by Google, is designed to get students excited about computing and computational thinking. It is a problem-solving contest with questions inspired by topics in computer science.

In the first round, held in their own schools, students solved as many problems as possible in the allotted time. There are six age categories. The highest scoring students from the four oldest age groups (Elite, Senior, Junior and Intermediate) were then invited to Oxford for the finals over two weekends in January and February.

The players capped off their day by dining with pupils in 1541, before parading the trophy through the school, giving pupils the chance to hold it up close and personal!






Getting crafty with Helaina


CREATIVE PUPILS from both the Junior and Senior school had the opportunity to spend time working with renowned craftsperson Helaina Sharpley in February.

Helaina works mainly in wire, creating lyrical and delicate three-dimensional drawings. She shared some of her techniques with pupils, and they quickly used their new skills to create work based on the theme for the day, which was insects.

Pupils started by creating a continuous line drawing, which was then used as a template for a wire sculpture. Different thicknesses and colours of wire were available to suggest different areas of the insect's body, and pupils were encouraged to explore a range of wire manipulation techniques to represent shape, form, textures and surfaces.

Junior School Art Teacher Mrs Savage said: "It was lovely to see pupils from the different year groups working together and sharing their results. The finished pieces are on display in the gallery."

Igniting *curiosity*

Trailblazing Antarctica interview by Blazer reporters



IN JANUARY, our *Blazer Magazine* newshounds were given the opportunity to conduct a telephone interview with alumnus Dr Jonathon Shanklin (OKS 1973), who is currently stationed in the Antarctic.

Dr Shanklin is undertaking his 20th trip to the earth's southernmost continent, where he is working for the British Antarctic Survey in the Halley VI Research Station. The station is situated on the treacherous Brunt Ice Shelf, which borders the coast of Coats Land, between Dawson Lambton Glacier and Stancomb Wills Glacier Tongue.

He began his scientific career by measuring the rainfall as a schoolboy in his Dodleston garden and is now an eminent meteorologist measuring the hole in the ozone layer.

Today, Dr Shanklin monitors the ozone layer from the Halley Research Station, an internationally important platform for global earth, atmospheric and space weather



observation in Antarctica. Dr Shanklin was one of the original authors of a 1985 report which identified the hole in the ozone layer.

The former King's School pupil is a member of the British Antarctic Survey. Talking from Halley, which rests on a floating ice shelf in the Weddell Sea, he gave us an insight into his research.

He said, "Climate change is definitely real and we can see evidence very clearly in the global scientific data. One of the things we do here at Halley is measure the temperatures and that contributes to part of the global picture of how climate is changing."

Dr Shanklin revealed that the evidence is clear

cut: the whole planet is warmer, with some places experiencing almost record levels.

And he warned, "Nobody is prepared to look themselves in the face and say 'we're creating this problem and we have to do something about it'."

When asked how he became a meteorologist, Dr Shanklin explained that he had very good physics teachers and encouraging parents. Although he disliked Latin lessons, the knowledge he acquired has helped his passion for botany. The school ski trips to Switzerland have also meant he can sometimes enjoy the thrill of being towed around Antarctica on skis by a skidoo.

'Share, Connect and Respect' – staying safe online

The play included an interactive session with the characters and "Stop The Action", where our J3 and J4 pupils could change the ending of the play by changing the outcome of certain scenes.

It was an imaginative way to deliver a very important message to our children.

At the school for nine years this Easter, Mrs Harding took some time out from a particularly busy day to give me an insight into Book Week and her thoughts on the importance of reading in general.

Q. What has the library been doing for Book Week?

A. We have scheduled the School Book Awards to conclude this week with voting going on for students' favourite books; we are holding a 'match the literary characters' competition, where members of staff are wearing name tags with book characters and pupils have to match the pairs, and we are running a tutor group 'book in a box' competition, where groups have to represent a book within a shoebox. This gives pupils a chance to show a more creative way to express their interest in books. We have also had a Removes Book Quiz and will be holding a House Book Quiz at the end of the week.

Q. We have also had some visits and Skype interviews with a number of other authors – how do you think they have gone?

A. Non Pratt is our Patron of Reading and she has spoken to a variety of people during her visit this week. As she has been to the school a few times. She is building up a relationship with the school and pupils. She spoke to a group of J3 and J4 pupils about writing news articles and also talked to all of the Removes about the power of stories, which was an excellent talk about our responsibilities as creators and consumers of stories. She also ran a discussion with some Fourth Year girls about getting into reading, which was really good as she is an outside influence. She gave a talk to some Sixth Formers on potential employment in writing and publishing, which was very interesting.

The Skype interviews with a range of authors are very good, as the instant interaction with authors shows that they are just human beings! When I was young, I wrote to an author and only got a reply after about six months! It opens it up to everyone and shows that reading and writing is for everyone.

Q. Considering that the number of libraries is on the decline around the country, how important do you think it is that we keep trying to encourage reading at school?

A. Absolutely vital. It breaks my heart to see libraries closing down where they are needed most. There's so many different reasons to read. There's the obvious educational side to further your studies – every single study shows that if you're reading for pleasure at the age of 15, then

it's more important than anything else in your life in predicting your future success, which is quite amazing really! When you read a book you live someone else's life – it's so good in creating empathy, and that makes you a better human being.

So, as you can see, Book Week at King's has been full of fun and fantastic opportunities for all students. I don't think there's a much better point to end this piece on aside from that reading makes you "a better human being", and if that doesn't stir up some reading enthusiasm within you, then I don't know what will. They were given the opportunity to season their bread with a variety of tasty condiments, which made for a delicious snack to enjoy as a reward for all their hard work!








Baking up support for Indian orphanage

After leaving King's, he studied Engineering at Cambridge University. Tom rowed for Cambridge in the famous Boat Race four times. However, it wasn't until his final year in 2007 when, as President, he achieved his first Boat Race victory. Tom remains on the Executive Committee for the Cambridge University Boat Club.

In the spring of 2008, Tom was selected for the coxless four in the Beijing Olympics. He went on to participate in arguably the stand out race from the 2008 Games, making a comeback to beat the Australian four, who had led for the large majority of the race, and winning the coveted gold medal.

At the 2012 London Olympics, he repeated his fantastic achievements in Beijing by claiming yet another gold medal as part of the coxless four crew. This was a great success, made even more impressive by triumphing on home turf. Tom was honoured with his very own Royal Mail postage stamp and also had a postbox in his home town of Wrexham painted gold. Tom was awarded an MBE for his services to sport in the 2009 New Year's Honours list.

He finally retired from competitive rowing in 2013 to pursue a career as a management consultant.

CONGRATULATIONS TO ALUMNUS Matt Hancock (OKS 1996), who was appointed Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport in January.

At 39 years old, Matt is the youngest member of the Cabinet and was previously Minister of State for Digital from July 2016 to January 2018. His promotion followed Karen Bradley's appointment as the new Northern Ireland Secretary as part of a Cabinet reshuffle.

Chester born Matt, who is married with two children and now lives in Little Thurlow, Suffolk, attended Farndon County Primary School, before joining The King's School.

Matt graduated from Oxford University with a degree in Philosophy, Politics and Economics, having studied at Exeter College, Oxford, and later received an MPhil in Economics from Christ's College, Cambridge. Matt became a member of the Conservative Party in 1999 and MP for West Suffolk at the 2010 general election.

The Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport has grown to cover a range of portfolios and is tasked with driving growth, enriching lives and promoting Britain abroad.

Matt is a big fan of horse racing and even trained to become a jockey for a charity horse race in 2012, raising £10,000 and losing two stone in the process.



Pioneering surgeon Richard features in BBC2 documentary

AN ALUMNUS who is carrying out pioneering work to increase the number of viable organs for use in transplant surgery has been featured in a BBC Two documentary series.

Richard Laing (OKS 2000) and his colleagues were profiled in Surgeons: At the Edge of Life: The Pioneers, in January

Within his role as a Wellcome Trust Clinical Research Fellow, Richard is part of a clinical trial between University Hospitals Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust and the University of Birmingham, which is investigating the feasibility of using 'discarded' livers to tackle the shortage of liver donors. The trial hopes to increase the number of 'transplantable' livers.

Thanks to the development of a technique called machine perfusion, the team are testing the function of these livers prior to using them for transplantation. This trial follows on from a pilot study which resulted in the successful transplantation of five out of six perfused livers that were initially rejected for use.

The programme, part of a series of three, followed the trial every step of the way, as Richard received a donor liver that would usually be rejected and tried to prove its viability for transplant by testing it on a perfusion device. This machine supports the liver by mimicking the supply of blood, oxygen and nutrients an organ receives inside a live, healthy human body.

Deaths from liver disease have soared by 40% in a decade and continue to increase. Demand for liver transplants far exceeds availability of donors, so patients on the transplant waiting list are facing a longer wait and approximately 20% of patients die on the waiting list before a suitable organ can be found.

The inside story from former MOD Chief of Security

KING'S PUPILS had the opportunity to listen to the fascinating and daring exploits of Kevin Jones (OKS 1985), former Chief of Security at the Ministry of Defence and an expert in cyber security, when he visited in January.

Having spent 30 years in the army defending his country, with deployments to the Gulf, Sarajevo, Bosnia Kosovo/Macedonia and Afghanistan, Kevin now defends the networks, data and devices of world renowned bank JPMorgan Chase.

Deployed first as an operator and then team leader, he conducted covert counter terrorist operations (intelligence and security) in some of the most politically sensitive and hostile environments in the world. Kevin rose within the Ministry of Defence to the position of Chief of Security and latterly Senior Cyber Intelligence Executive at Government Communication Headquarters, better known as GCHQ.

Through his current role at IPMorgan Chase, Kevin was able to tell pupils about the sophisticated techniques used by the 'bad guys', as he put it, to steal the bank's assets or destabilise their operations. Pupils were gripped by his first hand accounts and incredible experiences.

When one pupil asked, "What is the most scared you have ever been?", he replied, "Right now talking to you!", which seems remarkable considering his distinguished and, at times, perilous career.

Kevin reflected that he thoroughly enjoyed his time at King's. After leaving, he didn't take the traditional route to university, but instead joined the army to complete his qualifications. He encouraged all pupils interested in the armed forces, or in pursuing a technology career, to aim as high as possible but always have an escape route - perhaps a nod to his years as a soldier.

The visit was hosted by Mr Rahman, Head of Computing and Information Technology, and the Alumni Team, and we hope to welcome Kevin back to the school again in the future.

Matt makes giant strides in cross country!

Honours from the Humane Society for hiking hero Mr Duncalf

JUNIOR SCHOOL TEACHER, Mr Duncalf, was recently awarded a Commendation from the Humane Society for saving a 16-year-old after she became ill whilst trekking in South Africa.

Mr Duncalf was hiking in a three-man team when the teenager suffered a severe asthma attack on a mountain in Southern Drakensberg.

The incident unfolded at 2,200ft, just after the decision was taken to abandon the trek due to dangerous conditions caused by 80mph winds. Attempts to use her inhaler proved unsuccessful and, due to her continued breathing difficulties, she began to drift in and out of consciousness.

It took the three-man team more than five hours to carry the distressed girl to safety.

Andrew Chapman, secretary of the Royal Humane Society, said, "It must have been an incredibly gruelling, harrowing and seemingly never-ending trip carrying her down the mountain. The three of them did an absolutely superb job with the result that she survived the ordeal and was, amazingly, released from hospital the next day. They richly deserve the awards they receive."
