from *The Good Schools Guide*, which praises both our continued academic success and a renewed commitment to student well-being, with one parent commenting that the focus of the school is on "kindness, warmth and care".

The Good Schools Guide (GSG) reviews more than 1,000 schools, covering state and independent, boarding and day, mainstream and special sectors. A GSG representative visited King's in November, spent the day touring all areas of the school, and met with an array of pupils, parents and staff.

Summarising the outstanding academic performance and vast co-curricular programme, the report concluded King's is:

A fantastic, vibrant and friendly environment in which your child can attain high academic goals while nurturing their interests and passions, whatever they may be.

The report begins by discussing the impact of changes being made by Headmaster George Hartley.

One example cited is the scrapping of end of year exams for Year 7 and 8 students, in favour of regular assessments and the tracking of an individual's performance throughout the year.

The report says, "He wants to mix academic excellence with outstanding pastoral care. It's an educational elixir he hopes to deliver by helping students 'learn in a way that is sustainable': to take the undue pressure out of exams and introduce appropriately paced studying,"

Commenting on parental feedback, it says "Parents, too, seemed very aware of the

increased pastoral emphasis; one suggested the school suffered locally from the perception that it was concerned only about academic results. 'And it's not, it's all genuinely about looking after the child,' he said."

Focusing on Willow Lodge and the Junior School, the report highlights the individual support and care given to each pupil.

One parent whose child had struggled in maths said, "the school had worked with him at lunchtimes, even pulling in a maths teacher who was also his football coach because they communicated well. They work on little weaknesses, was the parental echo; they see the whole child, and don't label them."

It also praises the Head of Infants and Juniors, Margaret Ainsworth.

"Mrs Ainsworth is a fan of children learning without boundaries, learning about team building and risk taking. She exudes warmth, care, accomplishment and efficiency. 'A well run ship' one parent said. Another described her as 'phenomenal'."

Mr Hartley welcomed the report, saying, "We are obviously delighted with such a cracking report from The Good Schools Guide. It's particularly heartening to read that they were able to get an appreciation of the excellent pastoral care that sits alongside academic achievement at King's, as well as the extraordinary wealth of extra-curricular opportunities available to students.

"I am also pleased to read that the unrelenting focus we place on the support of individual pupils has been recognised, as it's this commitment to their well-being and sustainable success that defines and inspires our school community."

WE RECENTLY HELD OUR second Sustainability Day, promoting the importance of reducing our carbon footprint and environmental impact.


Students were encouraged to Bike, Bus or Bunch up!

Every year group in the Senior School has been able to talk to at least one author this half-term. Thirds and Fifths skyped with M.A. Bennett (author of *STAGS*) and were able to find out about her inspiration for this book as well as her journey as a writer.

Fourths and Lower Sixth had a Skype chat with Will Hill (author of *After the Fire*) and it was fascinating to learn about how the text of the book had been written quite quickly, but working out the unusual structure of it had taken a lot longer!

Upper Sixth students had a Skype chat with Sarah Crossan, author of *Moonrise*, and, due to the subject matter of the book, this was a fascinating insight into Sarah's opinions on capital punishment but also gave us an understanding on why she chooses to write in verse and the emotional connection this provides for the reader.

In addition to the book awards we also held a *Harry Potter* Book Day. The library was filled with owls, *Harry Potter* themed decorations and students enjoying the many different activities that were on offer, with Slytherin emerging as the victorious House!

Lucky Removes pupils had the opportunity to talk to Lauren Wolk (author of *Beyond the Bright Sea*) all the way from Cape Cod and have chatted to Nicholas Bowling (author of *Witchborn*, OKS 2003) and Lissa Evans (author of *Wed Wabbit*). Their enthusiasm for the books was great to see and they had plenty of questions for all authors. Thanks to a bit of inside

We were particularly pleased to welcome Pam Smy, author and illustrator of *Thornhill*, into the school for a day's visit. What is your all-time favourite children's hook?


I don't think I could pick one but I do absolutely love a book called *Charmed Life* by Diana Wynne Iones.

Alan, CEO of the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA), kindly offered the school use of the institute's magnificent Florence Hall, located within its beautiful art deco headquarters in central London, to host an alumni get-together.

More than 100 alumni gathered for a truly memorable evening, which included speeches from two of King's highest profile alumni – Secretary of State for Health and Social Care, Matt Hancock (OKS 1995), and founder of Money Saving Expert and consumer champion, Martin Lewis OBE (OKS 1990).





Addressing the guests, Matt said, "I'm here because this is what matters, that we ourselves appreciate and are grateful to that which gave us the education and the background to do what we do now. Communities are built on people paying back to the institutions and communities that supported them, without any sense of something in return and not due to a formal contract, but to a sense of social obligation.

"I'm here because I believe deeply in the value that King's Chester brings to the boys, and now girls, that it educates, and what it can do to ensure that children get the very best start in life. I care deeply about that and I want to help in every way that I can."

Martin Lewis then took to the lectern and delivered a passionate address about a number of topics

close to his heart. These included the importance of financial education for school-aged children, in particular enabling them to distinguish between good debt and bad debt and the relationship between mental health and money.

Headmaster George Hartley closed the evening by outlining his strategic vision for the school over the next ten years and presenting the three alumni Leading Light Awards for 2018.

The awards were presented to Matt Hancock, Martin Lewis and Consultant Paediatrician Ravi Jayaram (OKS 1985) for their outstanding achievements within their professional fields and their continued links to the school

A vision for bursaries

IN SEPTEMBER 2016, THE KING'S 100 CHALLENGE was launched by the then Headmaster, Chris Ramsey, with the full support of the school's governing body.

Our aim is to raise sufficient funds by 204 to create 100 extra senior school bursary places for economically disadvantaged, but talented children. In 2041, we will

mark the 500th anniversary of our school's foundation by Henry VIII, whose ambition was to provide an education for '24 poor and friendless boys'

We want to regain some of the philanthropic support for children from low income families that existed in earlier years and increase the number of senior school pupils on bursaries, from the current 7% to 20%

With assistance from governors, alumni, parents, local businesses and foundations our campaign is gaining momentum and attracting support. Our first milestone by 2020 is to raise £2 million and we're well on track!

Rowing Together for Healthy Minds

KSRC HAS BECOME one of the first school boat clubs to become affiliated with the mental health movement



RTHM (Rowing Together for Healthy Minds), which is a partner of Mind Charity. The student-led organisation is unique as it not only aims to raise money for mental health charities such as Mind, but its key goal is to raise awareness of mental health within the sport.

The student executives of the club, Owen Parsonage (KS), Jack Roberts and Oliver Irvine, have organised the affiliation. It involves displaying posters and literature around the club, nominating and promoting mental wellbeing champions within the club, and racing in the RTHM T-shirts underneath King's kit.

The entire 1st VIII will be taking the role of mental well-being champions. The purpose of the role is to show members of the club where to find help. This means that they are an additional point of contact for people who are suffering from a mental health problem or have concerns about themselves or others.

The student executives have arranged for King's crews to join many others and race at School's Head in the RTHM tech tops. We believe that actions speak louder than words, and having all King's athletes racing in the tops will help convince both our club and others that mental health isn't something to be ashamed of talking about.

WITH 80 ATHLETES SELECTED TO RACE at the Schools' Head and a further 46 selected to race at the National Sculling Head, the national level races on the Thames and at Dorney Lake were set to be an exciting time for the King's School Rowing Club. Severe weather hampered the Schools' Head, resulting in seven crews being unable to race; a further octuple at the Sculling Head was also withdrawn.

The crews that did get the opportunity represented the club and school with pride. The boys 1st VIII (Championship VIIIs) returned in style to the top eight in the country, finishing eighth in the field and setting expectations and hopes high for the summer months ahead. The girls championship boat, the J16 VIII, also rowed a strong course and

finished in eighth place in their event. The boys championship level VIIIs at their respective levels also produced encouraging results, with the J16 VIII finishing in 11th and the J15 VIII finishing in eighth.

The following Monday was the turn of the J14 and J15 sculling crews to compete at Dorney Lake. The girls boated an octuple and coxed quad and competed well at their first national level event.

The J15 boys coxed quad also put in their best performance of the season so far. The J14 boys octuples both completed a successful head race season. The J14 boys 2nd octuple produced a fantastic result, placing fourth in their category. The J14 1st octuple finished in second place overall; this was a fine achievement for the crew with 43 octuples in the field.

Inter-regional time trials

The 1000m time trial was held on the Northwich Head race course and the winners of each category gained selection to represent the North West at the Junior Inter-Regional Regatta (JIRR), held in Peterborough on 27 April. We were greeted with some wet and cold weather, but it was no hindrance to our trialling athletes: we took the conditions in our stride and held some great form throughout the day.
