Celebrating 50 wonderful years at Wrexham Road

The weekend to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the School's relocation to Wrexham Road in September was a spectacular success, commencing with a concert on Friday night for parents, pupils, staff (past and current) and Old King's Scholars. Music was provided by the Concert Band, Gospel Choir and Big Band.

On Saturday morning, the School was pleased to welcome the Right Hon. Frank Field MP to unveil a sculpture which marked the beginning of the Open Day. The copper tree sculpture with 50 leaves, each representing a year in the School's life, was designed and overseen by the Design and Technology Department. The sculpture was made by students in Shells.

Also on Saturday, a wonderful exhibition of the School archives displayed past uniforms, memorabilia and film footage of the School's Opening Day and a trip to Ullswater in the 1980s. Current students gave tours of the School to former pupils. For many former pupils this was their first visit to King's since leaving and they were amazed by the changes.

More than 400 former pupils, parents and staff attended the 50th Anniversary Ball which was hosted in a marquee within the School grounds on Saturday night. They were treated to a spectacular evening with pupil performances at the drinks reception by a string quartet, and dancing to the School's Big Band. A tombola with 100 prizes raised almost £3,500 for the Bursary

On Sunday morning, the School's Chamber Choir and a selection of advanced string players led the music at the Eucharist service at the Cathedral. Meanwhile, at the Boathouse, around 30 former pupils, including Olivia Whitlam (Olympic and GB rower) and Mike Thorpe (Cambridge Boat Race 2010), enjoyed a morning of races against our current VIIIs. Olivia took the opportunity to take a look at the boat which was named after her and made by King's Boatman, John Blackwell.

In the afternoon, approximately 40 Old King's Scholars and staff met for the CAOKS President's Lunch in the Marquee.

The memorable weekend of events saw current and former pupils, parents, staff (old and new) and three King's Headmasters celebrate this wonderful institution.

...for Upper Sixth **Formers**

The Upper Sixth Formers were delighted with their A Level results, with more than a fifth of passes being graded A*. The A* grade was introduced for the first time this year.

Three pupils achieved particularly outstanding results: James Carr (U6SW) and Emma Walker (U6NS) were awarded five A Levels at A* and Sam Lewis (U6LB) gained four As and 1 A*.


Gaining four A*/A were: Sophie Clough (U6AM) - three A* and one A; Will Moreland (U6DY) three A* and one A; Charlotte Gillies (U6ER) two A* and two As; Isabel Hughes (U6LB) – two A* and two As and Jack Webb (U6SB) - three A* and one A.

Matt Ireland (U6ER) and James Oldman (U6SW) gained 3 A* each and a further 18 students achieved over three As.



GCSE results make the grade-again

Once again this year, King's pupils have achieved excellent results in their GCSEs. Almost 42% of pupils gained A*/A grades in ten subjects or more and just under three quarters of all grades awarded



Miriam Bowen (L6SW) passed twelve GCSEs with ten A* and two A grades. Christina Davies (L6CH) gained eleven GCSEs including eight A* and three A grades.

Five other students gained straight A* in all their ten subjects; Kate Coppack (L6KL), Felicity Elsegood (L6CH), Laura Haylock (L6ER), Luke Howarth (L6SW)



and Henry Crouch-Smith (L6DY).

A further 29 pupils gained ten A*/A grade at GCSE.

Giving science brains a work out -

at the Liverpool Physics Olympics





Thirty-six teams from across the North and Midlands entered the annual Liverpool Physics Olympics which were held at the Physics department of the University. The King's School were given special dispensation to enter two teams, such was the interest generated amongst the Upper Sixth Form.

The day consisted of five practical events, involving such challenges as finding the height of a mountain on the moon from the shadow cast as seen on a photograph. In one of these five events, King's 'Team Kelvin' consisting of Lewis Ankers (U6JS), Tom Menzies (U6KS), James Ellis (U6JS) and Graham Bendall (U6KS) were placed first.

Running throughout the day was the theoretical Fermi quiz, where each team had to answer 15 questions to the nearest order of magnitude. King's 'Team Epsilon,' consisting of Ben Moss (U6KS), James Edholm (U6KS), Oliver Tattersall (U6JK) and Matt Chadwick (U6KS) finished second overall in this event, with first place going to the other King's team, Kelvin.

At the end of the day all scores are aggregated to find an eventual top three. The King's School 'Team Kelvin' finished in second place!

Siobhan Barnard (U6BH), working with Liverpool University, undertook a project involving the collation and analysis of data for Key Stage 2 results of schools in the Ellesmere Port area. Her placement was with the Ellesmere Port Education Improvement Partnership.

Ben Moss (U6KS) carried out his project at OpTIC in St Asaph, working on a robotic finger controlled by optical wires, and achieved a CREST Gold Award. He has also

James was asked to return to OpTIC for another four weeks as a result of his successful time there the previous year, when he was actually too young to be there as a Nuffield Bursary student and Matthew worked on a project at ABB Engineering in Warrington.

After a summer working on their Nuffield Bursary projects, students from The King's School successfully presented their work at the CREST awards at the World Museum, Liverpool.

Under the direction of Emma Lucia of Clwyd Theatr Cymru, 15 pupils presented an outdoor promenade production of Shakespeare's classic pastoral comedy "As You Like It" to enchanted audiences in the School grounds.

The play tells us that "all the world's a stage," so in a bold move the decision was taken to keep all the actors "on stage" and in character throughout the two hours of each of the four performances, with audience members free to wander between areas of staging as the action developed. This gave ample opportunities for these young actors to demonstrate their talents not only to audience members but also to the examiner from Trinity Guildhall, who came to assess their work.

Even the British weather played its part to perfection, as the sun shone down on every performance, and we all "liked it" very much indeed!






Bringing 'Home' the poetry prizes

This term, the School was delighted to announce the exciting new Theatre Development Project which will be opening in summer 2011. The project, costing £1.2m, has been part-funded by a generous legacy to the school from a former pupil.

The development will see the demolition of the current 1960's School Hall and its replacement by a state-of-the-art theatre with a balcony and tiered seating for an audience capacity of 300. The Theatre will be used for the regular drama productions King's undertakes

annually and the seating can be retracted to make use of the space for other school events.

This ambitious project started over the summer holiday period and will continue until at least May 2011.



A **Cork**-ing trip for the Big Band

During the October half term holiday, The King's School Big Band travelled to Ireland to perform at the world famous Cork Jazz Festival. They played alongside legends such as Herbie Hancock, Steve Winwood, Maceo Parker and The Brand New Heavies.

The band gave two superb concerts, one at The Atrium at The Clarion Hotel, and then at the heart of the festival - The Ballroom at the Gresham Metropole Hotel, as part of the Guinness Festival Club.

As well as the performances, the Band

took part in a wide range of workshops and masterclasses with jazz experts Charles McPherson, Guillermo Rozenthuler and Bill Carrothers. They went to performances by Herbie Hancock, Jason Moran and the incredible One O'Clock Lab Band from the University of North Texas.

THE BIG Biology Challenge

Students from King's have taken part in the Biology Challenge which is run by the British Biology Olympiad Organisation.

This new nationwide challenge was established to foster an interest in bioscience with questions on biodiversity, physiology and current developments in biology.

20,000 students participated in the competition, with 4,000 winners of gold, silver and bronze certificates. There were 1,000 students awarded certificates at a highly commended level.

Sean Telford (5DL) gained a Gold Award, with Jeremy Telford (5DL), Matthew Barrett (5DL) and William Marshall (5JM) gaining Silver Awards.

MATHS – the name of the game in tough Olympiad

Six students took part in the Intermediate Mathematical Olympiad ran by the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust.

Of the participants, only the top 25% receive Certificates of Distinction; the rest receive Certificates of Participation. Additionally, the top 100 in each year group receive a medal and the top 50 in each year group receive a book prize. Only the top 1600 from the Maths Challenge were invited to sit the Olympiad, so

this is a fantastic achievement in itself for the pupils!

Eleanor Barnard (4ET), Jeremy Telford (5DL), Sean Telford (5DL), Matthew Temple (4AC), and Luke Howarth (L6SW), have been awarded 'Certificates of Merit'. Matthew Hill (5JM) was awarded a 'Certificate of Participation'.



A prize-winning day at Chester Racecourse

For the first time, the School celebrated its annual Prize-giving at Chester Racecourse. This enabled the whole School to celebrate the pupils' fantastic achievements together.

Prizes were awarded to students for their achievements and endeavours throughout the previous academic year. This included awards for 'Academic Achievement', 'Academic Endeavour' and numerous sport and subject-specific awards. The awards were presented by Professor Christopher Andrew MA PhD. After the conclusion of formal proceedings, refreshments were served in the Pavilion Suite.

In addition to the awards, musical entertainment was provided by many of the School's musicians. This included barber shop and string quartet



performances. Zara Fyfe (U6CH) performed a solo vocal performance.

It was a fantastic occasion that was much enjoyed by students, staff and parents alike.



The King's School has enjoyed an excellent reputation for success in chess over the last few years. This year has been the best yet, with King's being named 'School of the Year 2010' by the Northern Counties Chess Federation for promoting chess in the North of England. The School has also been awarded 'Centre of Excellence' status by the British Chess Federation.

On Saturday 9th October, 152 students from across the region took part in the Cheshire and North Wales Junior Chess Championships, hosted this year at The King's School. For the third successive year, King's was Cheshire and North Wales Secondary School Champion. The final results were:




Andrew Walton submitted his Travel

Enjoying a taste of the Big Apple

After touching down in 'The Big Apple', pupils rushed to climb 86 floors to the top of the Empire State Building. It was followed by tea at the Grand Central terminal and a stroll through Times Square.





On day two of the trip, they visited the world famous Museum of Modern Art. The work on show in the gallery can easily be described as the 'greatest hits' of the history of modern art! Later that day, pupils walked through Central Park and marvelled at the New York skyline, including buildings such as the Lever building and the Seagram building. Pupils took the opportunity to visit the Guggenheim Museum, where they had a chance to view pieces of 20th century art-work in an inspiring architectural structure. From there, they walked up 5th Avenue to the Met so that they could study the colossal collection of artefacts and artworks.

After visiting the Fuller Building, pupils enjoyed some time on the Fulton Landing, gazing at the Manhattan skyline whilst basking in glorious sunshine. From there, they embarked upon a busy jaunt across the Brooklyn Bridge. On day three of the trip, pupils also saw the Woolworth building and walked up Wall Street to Federal Hall and the New York Stock Exchange, pausing a while at the World Trade Centre construction site. They finished the day by looking inside the iconic Chrysler Building and the Rockefeller Centre.

On their final morning in Manhattan, pupils walked through Chelsea, passing Macy's, the world's largest department store; Madison Square Garden, one of the world's most famous arenas and the impressive structure of the New York General Post Office.

The pupils gathered a rich body of resource material and all of the staff look forward to seeing them bring a little bit of New York City to the walls of King's.

During September, 18 French students and two teachers from Avignon spent ten days in Chester as part of a school exchange programme. The group stayed with their King's friends during the visit. They spent the week visiting places of interest in the region and also spent a morning at the School.

Some of the French guests joined the Year 11 pupils in a French lesson where the King's students were making best use of their guest's visit to polish up their French speaking!

The visit should have happened last term, but was postponed due to the problems with the ash cloud affecting flights to the United Kingdom.



JOINING IN THE BIG DEBATE

The King's School was represented at the 2010 MFL Northern Schools debating competition by six Sixth Formers: Richard Capes (L6SP) and Max Imfeld (L6ER) in German, Dominic Thurlow-Wood (U6JK) and Ed Pilkington (U6NS) in Spanish and Ilina Sen (U6BH) and Oliver Thompson (U6NS) in French. They competed against teams from eleven other leading independent schools in a series of debates on the following topics:

- In the age of globalisation, the nation state has lost its power.
- The job of the paparazzi is immoral.
- Immigrants should adopt the customs and culture of their adopted country.
- The ends justify the means.
- Environmentalists are extremists.

Each of the King's teams took part in two debates chosen at random from the above list. They had to be prepared to argue either for or against each motion. Points were awarded to each team on a scale of 0 to 5. The results of the King's debates were a 4-3 win and a 2-3 loss in German, a 3-2 win and a 3-4 loss in Spanish and a 3-4 loss and a 4-3 win in French.

Whilst these results did not produce any overall winners, all three King's teams were complimented for the quality of their reasoning, for the enthusiastic way in which they countered their opponents' arguments and, above all, for their good teamwork - whilst not forgetting the advanced language skills which were a prerequisite for the competition.



Cadet Force celebrate 150th Anniversary...



To celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the Cadet Force, students from The King's School Combined Cadet Force attended a Royal Review in London. The Review included a Parade, a Flyover by the Red Arrows and a Garden Party.



Cadets from the King's School paraded down the Mall from Horseguards Parade and into Wellington Barracks, the home of the Foot Guards where they then reformed and marched to Buckingham Palace. Once inside the palace the Cadets formed the Honour Guard with the Yeoman Warders ready to greet His Royal Highness, The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall.

During the first phase of the expedition, King's students canoed, pitched their tents, collected wood for camp fires and cooked meals. They shared stories around the campfire and fished in the lakes. Swimming in the

The project phase of the expedition aimed to help the local community by opening up an old trail to encourage tourists to visit the area. This involved clearing a couple of kilometres of overgrown trees,

deadwood, weeds and branches.

The students learnt new skills, experienced the excitement of new surroundings and gave something back to the community that they visited. In July 2011, students from King's will visit Peru and Bolivia in South America on another challenging expedition.

Experiencing the incredible history of Berlin

For historians in particular, Berlin is a magnificent city. Buildings, artefacts and ghosts from the Wilhelmine, Weimar, Third Reich and Cold War periods rub shoulders with 21st century innovation and design.

For this reason, 18 A Level students accompanied by four members of staff spent five days in Berlin over the half term. Guided by Colonel Piers Storie-Pugh OBE in his ninth year of trips with King's and Major Mike Cartwright, who commanded the Berlin Signal Squadron for two years during the Cold War. All of the party left with heads spinning, full of images and impressions of this constantly evolving city.

Of course, this may have been caused by the Mr Neal 'two for the price of one' 23 minute guided dash through the Story of Berlin Museum! It was all in a good cause, however, as everyone raced to the German Historical Museum where the party leader charmed two burly female museum employees into allowing the group into the much talked about "Hitler and the Germans" exhibition.

A flavour of eighteenth and nineteenth century German history was sampled in Potsdam, a delightful oasis of calm away from the city. Stark reminders of Berlin's pivotal role in twentieth century events were brought home to everyone on the trip as King's old friend Torben gave a magnificent walking tour of Third Reich sites. The icy rain and wind were appropriate, if not appreciated. Major Cartwright guided the students around Sachsenhausen concentration camp and the quite staggering Soviet memorial to troops killed in the Battle of Berlin at Treptower Park. Cold War divisions between the capitalist west and communist east were spelt out to the visitors. The group toured Normannenstrasse, the former Headquarters of the Stasi, the hated East German secret police. Hohenschönhausen, the former prison used by the Stasi until 1989, was a frightening place, doubly so when building materials from the roof into the

courtyard where the students had been standing minutes earlier, came crashing down!

Group Captain Andrews, the Air and Naval Attaché who hosted the group at the British Embassy, was full of praise for the quality of questions he faced. Colonel Storie-Pugh wrote that "this group of students was the most impressive of all the groups" he had met over the last nine years.



Ambassadors shine at the Model United Nations



Two delegations of 13 students from King's attended the Model **United Nations conference at** Cheadle Hulme School during October. The MUN provides students with a unique opportunity to debate and discuss the key international issues that affect the world today with the aim of negotiating peaceful solutions. With 90 delegations from over 30 schools in the UK and abroad, the standard of debate was high.

A handful of students from each Committee are recognised at an Award Ceremony to reflect the quality of their contribution towards the debate and the effectiveness of their speechmaking. It is remarkable then that five King's delegates were recognised. Kallum Marsden (L6AM) representing North Korea on the Economic and Social Committee was a Highly Commended Delegate at his first conference

which is very impressive. Also commended were Fred Norman (L6SP) for North Korea on the Political Committee, James Ellis (U6JS) for Senegal on the Economic and Social Committee and Luke Howarth (L6SW) for Senegal in the Human Rights Committee.

Jack Webber (4MG), the only delegate from the Fourth Form was recognised as the Best Young Delegate in his Committee which debated issues concerning of Ecology and the Environment. This is the first time a delegate from King's has achieved this accolade.

At the General Assembly, an emergency resolution, for which no preparation is possible, was debated in front of the 500 people at the Conference. Senegal's resolution was selected for debate and Tim Pemberton (U6JS) and Alex Austin (U6JS) took to the platform and

presented their proposal. They spoke with passion about the situation and responded excellently to points of information from the floor, a daunting prospect for many, which they did with great style.

The U10 swimming team returned awash with medals following the autumn AJIS Boys' Swimming Gala at Merchant Taylors' School.


