SIXTH FORM STARS REACH ANOTHER LEVEL

It was another great day for King's as Sixth Formers celebrated an excellent crop of A-level results in August.

Over a fifth of students gained the coveted A* grades and almost 40% of the 111 King's sixth formers gained A/A* grade in three A levels or more.

Five A levels were achieved by Miriam Bowen (four A* and one A) who has gone to read Mathematics at Warwick and Luke Howarth (three A* and two A) who has gone to study English at Oxford.

Seven girls and eight boys gained four A levels with all A/A* grades being achieved by Jenny Corlett, Henry Crouch-Smith, Richard Dawson, Ketan Dhital, Felicity Elsegood, Emily Guest, Miranda Harle, Dona Kumar, Fred Norman, Bharat Sharma, PJ Wang and Raymond Williams.

Kate Coppack achieved four A levels including one A* and two A and Lottie Frazer Cox achieved four A levels including two A* and one A. Selim Ungut also achieved four A levels, including one A* and two A grades.

Hattie Webb gained four A levels including one A* and two A and has gone to study Archaeology and Anthropology at Cambridge; James Goulbourne achieved three A* grades and has gone to read Economics at Cambridge and Bradley Davies achieved four A levels including two A* and one A and has gone to Oxford to read Chemistry.

This year's crop of offers brings the total number of Oxford and Cambridge places gained by King's to 80 in the last nine years.

A further 31 students (14 girls and 17 boys) gained at least three A*/A grades with two of these – James Barnard and Ryan Thompson achieving all three at A* grade. These were: Harry Ashworth, Eleanor Bunting, Matthew Burgess,

GCSE and iGCSE results that speak for themselves

The King's School celebrated another set of excellent results as GCSE and iGCSE results were announced in August.

Eight pupils gained ten A* grades: Peter Boothroyd, Jessica Guest, Jack Jameson, Tom Jameson, Henry Makings, Tommy Metcalf, Hayley Milner, and Cameron Winter. A further seven pupils achieved nine A* and one A: Eleanor Barnard, Elisabeth Cousins, Guy Dunbavand, Jack Peake, Ananth Ranjit (nine A* plus two A), Isabel Reid and Henry Thompson.

55% of pupils gained eight, nine or ten A*/A grades. King's girls performed extremely well with 44% of grades being A* and 76% A*-A

King's results included iGCSE in the following subjects: Maths, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Music, French, Spanish and German.

From September 2013, English Literature and English Language courses will move to the iGCSE qualification.



WELL-VERSED FINALISTS READ ALOUD

To celebrate National Poetry Day, King's pupils competed in 'The Poetry Games'. Pupils from all years submitted their poems, and 13 poet finalists were then chosen to read their poems before staff and other pupils, as well as guest judge and Poet, Clive McWilliam in The Vanbrugh Theatre.



Finalists were assigned a Sixth Form mentor, who gave suggestions on how to improve poems and help practise reading aloud with expression. As ever, judging proved very difficult, and two joint winners emerged. The two winning poems were The Whisper of Thoughts by Andrew Darby (4DR), mentored by Matthew Spencer (U6JS), and

Monster by Rachel Huber (3RL), mentored by Chris Robson (U6NS).

A special mention was given to Gabriel Parry (ShAI), mentored by Oliver Bradley (U6NH), for his crowd pleasing poem about Everton Football Club entitled Everyone has a Religion – but mine is different.

Young voices turn up the volume

The King's Scholars 2012



The King's School announced The King's Scholars for 2012 in July. These academic scholarships are awarded to up to 12 pupils at the end of the Removes (Year 7) year.

Pupils are nominated by teachers based on their work throughout their first year in the Senior School and scholars are selected further to an interview with the Headmaster and presentation on a subject of their choice. Scholars are awarded £500 and the accolade of having KS after their name during their time at King's. The term 'King's Scholars' was first used by Henry VIII when he founded King's and was re-introduced at the School around seven years ago with the introduction of the scholarship awards.

ALISTAIR AND PETER ENGINEER COVETED SCHOLARSHIP

Alistair Coley (L6SW) and Peter
Boothroyd (L6SB) have been awarded
sought-after Arkwright Engineering
Scholarships that identify them as some of the
country's future leaders in engineering and related areas of design.

The renowned Arkwright Engineering Scholarships provide the students with a £600 financial award to enhance their A level studies and a range of activities to enhance their understanding and experience of engineering. King's will also receive £400 for each scholarship that its students have been awarded. The scholarships are respected by leading universities and industrial companies and are supported by top engineering employers such as Rolls Royce, BT, BAE Systems, National Grid, Balfour Beatty, Microsoft Research, Thales, The Royal Air Force and The Royal Navy.

Alistair and Peter had to successfully complete a rigorous selection process consisting of a detailed application form, a two hour aptitude paper and an interview hosted at a top engineering university.

The aptitude paper tested candidates' flair and originality in solving engineering design problems. The interview was a grilling in which candidates had to discuss an engineering project they had conducted. During the interview the candidates took part in a team exercise to solve a hands-on engineering problem working with students they had never met before. Candidates and their parents also toured the engineering facilities at the host university and explored the diversity of engineering and design careers and their importance to the UK economy.

The Scholarships were formally presented at a ceremony hosted by The Institution of Engineering and Technology.

Dr Martin Thomas, National Director of the Arkwright Scholarships Trust said: "I am delighted to see students from The King's School secure this prestigious accolade. Clearly, there is considerable technical talent in the Chester area. With the competition for rewarding jobs becoming evermore fierce, the receipt of an Arkwright Engineering Scholarship can help dynamic young people at the start of their journey to be the country's future leaders in engineering and related areas of design."

Jam entrepreneur spreads the word

The GCSE Business and Economics students enjoyed a fantastic and inspirational trip to Salford Quays in October to hear from four highly successful entrepreneurs.

Along with other schools from the North West, they listened to a presentation from Fraser Doherty, the founder of the iconic Scottish brand SuperJam. Fraser started producing jam from his parents' kitchen at the age of 14, selling to farmers markets and now supplies all the major supermarkets in the UK turning over £1million a year. The students were impressed with Fraser's vibrant and confident presentation and a few of them got to speak to him afterwards. They also enjoyed hearing from the founder of WedgeWelly and how success on Dragons' Den and subsequent partnership with Theo Pathitis helped them achieve an 800% increase in turnover.

The pupils also enjoyed their own success in the Student Enterprise Challenge. Four teams from King's entered the competition by designing a new and innovative product for the healthy living market, aimed at teenagers aged 14-19. Two of the King's teams, Jooci and Superfruit, were selected on the day as finalists and got to pitch their idea to the entrepreneurs in front of an




audience of around 400 people. The judges were impressed with the 30 second advert and pitch from both groups and Jooci walked away with 1st prize and the £100 prize money. Team members Zoe Rigby (4ET), Isabel Dawson (4ET), Sophie Drew (4PN), Harry Strudwick (4EH) and Natalie Tomlinson (4PN) were proud of their achievements and have been inspired to think about setting up their own business in the near future.

King's make move towards National Championship 4

King's again hosted the North Wales and Cheshire Junior Chess Competition with over 150 young competitors battling it out during the day. The King's players had more than their share of success. Jack Owen (4MP), Susan Gorman (L6PW), Matthew Temple (U6KS) and Sam Arshad-Roberts (L6SB) were among members of King's chess club who won at county level while Riyaan Yesudian (J3O), Nithilan Sivanand (J3O) and Rutujay Chawda (J1T) were successful in the junior rounds. After six gruelling rounds, King's won the prize for 'the best school' and can now look forward with enthusiasm to the National Championships.





Matthew has the right chemistry to meet the challenge

Sixth Former, Matthew Temple (U6KS) has won a prestigious 'Roentgenium' award at the national Cambridge Chemistry Challenge and was invited to attend a residential course in Cambridge over the summer holidays. Matthew was awarded with a crystal trophy at

a ceremony at the Royal Institution in Piccadilly, London. Only 39 students of the 4,296 who entered achieved this level, and Matthew was placed within the top 10.

Other awards given to King's pupils in the Chemistry Challenge include Sean Telford (U6NS) who won a gold award. Silver awards were won by Ben Hastings (U6JK) and Jeremy Telford (U6NS). Bethany Shears (U6JK), Mark Brownson (U6KS), Matthew Cook (U6NH), Benhur Johnson (U6KS) and William Marshall (U6JS) won copper awards.

The Cambridge Chemistry Challenge aims to stretch and challenge students to their full potential and provides the pupils with an excellent experience for anyone considering taking their studies further.

Dr Peter Wothers said: "It is encouraging to see this competition strike a chord with so many students. The competition allows students to apply knowledge of other subjects, think creatively and take their knowledge to the next level – these are exactly the kind of skills which are needed for university. It is therefore useful for students wanting to go on to study chemistry at undergraduate level because it gives them that outstanding flair!"



ROSE, MATTHEW AND WILF SHOWED GREAT MOMENTUM IN YORK

Rose Lindlay (3JJ), Matthew Williams (3JM), and Wilf Le Brocq (3JJ) travelled to York to take part in the St. Peter's School Physics Olympics.

This is the first time that King's have entered, and out of 32 teams King's came fourth, finishing in the top three in a couple of events. The students used their physics skills to take part in five practical events, such as tower building and rocket firing, and a theoretical task. The day was a great success.

In July, Terence Au (U6JK) was examined for a QCF Level 4 Diploma in Music performance – Violin. Having fulfilled the requirements of the syllabus, he was awarded the Diploma of the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music.

Four lucky pupil-poets from King's attended a poetry workshop in Chester Town Hall led by the well-known contemporary poet and writer Simon Armitage in October.

Simon led them through some stimulating writing exercises, building up to the composition of individual poems inspired by a significant personal photograph. At the end of the session, pupils presented Simon with a copy of the School poetry anthology 'Young Voices' in which there is a message to King's poets from Simon – "May your poems and your poets prosper". Pupils were very flattered when Simon asked them to sign the poems they had written – predicting their future fame as poets!

It is not the first time King's pupils have worked with Simon Armitage: he visited four years ago to give a reading of his poems and run a poetry workshop for Sixth Formers.





Tablets prove to be the best medicine

Since the beginning of the new academic year in September, King's pupils have been using iPads in various subjects as part of the first stage of an ambitious programme that could lead to all pupils using these devices in the near future.

Four departments; Art, Economics & Business Studies, English and History & Politics, have been trialling various aspects of these tablet computers, looking at the potential impact on pupils' learning. The use of mobile devices in education is now a well-established concept and has proved to be successful in helping to facilitate independent learning, at the very least by providing internet access for all students in any classroom and indeed beyond.

Mobile learning using smart phones and iPod touches has some benefit but the touch screen technology and intuitive nature of the iPad are seen as particular advantages, together with its size and portability. Students have been enjoying

However, the highlight of the expedition for all was to live and work in the community where King's had

raised enough money to build a school three years ago.




The Ambohimandroso community was delighted to welcome the students and a formal inauguration ceremony was held to open the new cyclone proof primary school in celebration of the visit. King's also funded the installation of a water pump at the school two years ago and whilst in the community, the students added to this work by assisting with the building of a bridge over the river the water is pumped from, now allowing the whole community to cross safely during the rainy season.

The students' paddling and endurance skills were challenged by a five day trip down the

Tsiribihina River in traditional wooden pirogues through an untouched and remote area of Madagascar accessible only by boat. The teams saw lots of wildlife along the way, camping on sandbanks at night and even had the chance for a wash under a beautiful waterfall.

To end the expedition the students visited the magnificent Avenue du Baobab for sunset, where giant trees, thousands of years old, stand in an almost straight line and then relaxed by enjoying a night in Morondava, a seaside town with beautiful white sandy beaches.

It was an experience they were extremely fortunate to take part in and all now have a lasting memory of the true friendliness and humility of the Madagascan people and of an impoverished community where both they and The King's School have

In keeping with a fine tradition of nurturing independence and responsibility in the School, this Michaelmas Term's production of *The History Boys* was directed by two Upper Sixth students. However, this time they were not only directing a group of their peers - a difficult enough task in itself – but also had to coax performances out of a parent and a teacher. Scarcely easy, when you're still going to have to face them over the breakfast table or the school desk!

And the subject matter is hard! Not only does Bennett have a lot to say about his views on education, but issues are also raised about sexuality, adolescence,



This year so far they have bought blades for a girls' VIII (£2,800), two single scull boats and a second-hand ergo (£2,450).

The senior girls' squad travelled to Boston, USA in October to compete in the biggest regatta in the world. The girls and their parents also worked hard to raise funds for their trip and through sales of cakes, running pop-up cafes at the boathouse and other events such as the Olympic rowing finals 'brunch' held in the summer, raised just over £2,700.

Harry rows to gold for GB in the Junior European Championships

Harry Brightmore, who left King's this summer, represented the GB Rowing Team in the Coupe de la Jeunesse, held in Banyoles, Spain in July. Harry coxed the VIII and Coxed Fours in this prestigious event.



In the two day event, Saturday saw the Coxed Four set high standards, securing a bronze medal just behind France and Italy. The VIII raced only two hours later – half the boat still with tired legs. Nevertheless GB led the 2,000m race from the start, nosing in front of Italy, but a ruthless push at the finish left the Italians in their wake and Spain, Switzerland and Belgium lengths behind. A gold medal was secured for the GB team, with a time of 5m 45s – one of the fastest on record for the Coupe.

On Sunday, a photo finish decided the fates of Italy, France, Spain and GB in the Coxed Fours, unfortunately leaving the GB team out of a medal this time. However the focus again was on the VIII and holding off the vengeance of the Italians. Although keeping their distance from Spain they were unable to catch Italy and crossed in silver medal position.

Harry said, "Once again, to represent both my country and The King's School, earning a bronze, silver and gold was a dream come true. I can take all the experience I have gained from this and all the years from The King's School Rowing Club with me to university and beyond!"

Clearwater for Olympian Tom James

King's Olympian, Tom James, spearheaded the 'Big Dee Day' clean-up, coordinated by Cheshire West and Chester Borough Council, Flintshire County Council and the Environment Agency. This two-day event works with local businesses, community groups, town councils, volunteers and neighbouring local authorities to address tidal litter on and around the River Dee and saw them all working together litter picking, clearing the area of debris and improving the local environment for people and wildlife.

This year, the launch of the event was hosted by Chester Racecourse, where Tom was introduced by the Lord

Tom then visited The King's School Boathouse, where he helped King's pupils pick litter from the parts of the river only accessible from the water.

Tom has also been honoured with the Freedom of the County Borough of Wrexham. It was bestowed on Tom from Coedpoeth at a special council meeting and celebration at the Guildhall. The Freedom of the County Borough is the highest award any council can bestow and Tom became the 30th recipient of the award which dates back to 1906.



Rob's lecture is ranked a winner



Former pupil and mathematician Rob Eastaway, who left King's in 1980, visited The King's School in October to give an inspiring lecture to Sixth formers. With Ted Dexter, Rob devised the international rankings for cricketers, now used as official rankings by the ICC.

Rob is also former President of the Mathematical Association and is frequently to be heard on BBC Radio. Rob's lecture was entitled 'From Lampard to the Olympics', and explained the Maths behind Sports. Pupils were particularly interested when Rob explained the mathematics behind Frank Lampard's

disallowed goal in the World Cup 2010 England vs. Germany game. He explained how it should have been possible for the referee to tell from anywhere on the pitch that the ball was definitely over the line (as the ball hit the cross bar twice) without the need for goal-line technology - had he known his maths!

Mike Thorp, 2009 leaver, came in to School during the summer holidays for a quick visit.

He had some time to describe his experience during the dramatic boat race this year when a swimmer tried to disrupt the race by jumping in the water, and also how it was his oar that smashed into the Oxford boat, causing more drama at the end of the race.

Mike also discussed the gruelling training and selection procedure that each potential member of the crew is put through, including military style exercises and drills – it certainly is not for the faint-hearted. 
