# Amazing A Level performance

ALL THE HARD WORK AND DEDICATION PAID OFF for our Upper Sixth leavers when their outstanding A Level results placed King's as the top performing school in Cheshire and the best co-ed in the North West this year.

Following the outstanding results, eight students began courses at Oxford or Cambridge and nine are now studying medicine, dentistry or veterinary science.

Overall, 87% of grades were graded A\* – B for the third consecutive year, with 64% at A\*- A grade.

Mr Hartley welcomed the fantastic news, "We are very proud to be top co-ed school for A Levels in the North West. These were a terrific bunch of results and, once again, I'd like to extend my congratulations to all the students and staff!"

Congratulations to Tom Ramsbottom who achieved 4 A\* grades. Amelia Standing, Owen Edwards and Aditya Iyer who all celebrated 3 A\*s and 1 A and Olivia Wade-Jones, Oliver Kidd and Robert Clark all achieved 3 A\* grades. Kieran Kumar gained 2 A\* and 2 A grades, with Roberto King receiving 2 A\*, 1 A and 1 B grade.

Three students (pictured, top right) celebrated top results after combining their studies with representing their country in their chosen sport.

Ameila Standing (A\*, A\*, A\*, A) was selected for team GB for the Junior European Rowing Championships last summer. She enjoyed huge success racing in the girls' VIII, taking the silver medal and winning two gold medals in the coxless 4. Amelia is now studying Engineering at Oxford University.

Triathlete Matthew Willis (A, A, A) won gold for Team GB in the Junior men's category of the Fyn ITU Multisport World Championships Festival held in Denmark and is current ITU Duathlon World Junior Champion, ETU Triathlon Junior European Cup Gold medallist, and was part of the GB elite squad for the ITU World Triathlon Championships in Australia in September. Matthew is now at Loughborough University, where he is studying Maths, Accounting and Financial Management.

Isabelle Howell (A\*, A, A) represented Wales in international hockey and played in the Commonwealth Games in Australia in April, where she scored her first official cap for the Senior Wales Hockey squad. She now attends Durham University, studying Liberal Arts.

### GCSE students on cloud nine

OUR GCSE STUDENTS were on cloud nine after achieving the best GCSE results in Chester, including those sat under the recently introduced grading system.

Grade 9 has been designed to recognise individuals who have performed at the very top of the former A\* grade category. Seventeen percent of the GCSEs sat at King's under the new grading system were awarded the top level 9, compared to 4.3% nationally.

Students did extremely well across the board, achieving the equivalent of 91 % A\*-B grades.

Forty-four per cent of all grades were at 9-8 (A\*) and King's girls put in a fantastic performance with  $58\,\%$  9-8 grade (A\*).

This includes Mia Hard Af Segerstad-Smith and Alchemy Lucas (KS) who were two of only 732 students in the UK to achieve seven grade 9s in the new GCSEs.

Other individual successes include: Martha Mulliner (KS) with five grade 9s, five A\*/8 and one A grade. Ellie Saunders achieved four grade 9s and six A\*/8s, and Elinor Sharples (KS) with four 9s and five A\*/8 grades.

Jonathan Carty (KS) gained three grade 9s, seven A\*/8 grades and one grade 7. Maya Adiyaman (KS) achieved five grade 9s, five A\*/8 and one B grade.

into the history of Berlin

THIRTY-ONE A LEVEL STUDENTS and four History teachers enjoyed a packed trip to Berlin over half term. On our first day, our two superb guides gave the party a fascinating introduction to Berlin's twentieth century history. The evening tour of the modern Bundestag showed just how applicable William Faulkner's line that, 'The past is never dead. It's not even past,' is to Berlin.

Refreshed and refuelled, we visited
Invalidenfriedhof and Dorotheenstadt on our
second day, reflecting on the lives of German
military and cultural greats such as von
Schlieffen, Hegel and Brecht, who are buried in
these cemeteries.

No trip to Berlin is complete without a trip to Bernauer Strasse and The Berlin Wall Memorial. This

road was literally split in two from 13 August 1961 and stories of East Berliners' attempts to reach the West and the sophistication of the 1980s Wall defences were brought home to all of our party.

Only half an hour away by train is Potsdam but bathed in autumn sun, Frederick the Great's palace and gardens at Sans Souci seemed a different country and a world away from edgy big city Berlin. Mr S Neal's illuminating stories added an appropriately eighteenth century flavour to our tour before we returned to the city and dined at the ultra-modern Sony Centre.

By Day three, it felt like we had been in the city for weeks. A fascinating walking tour of the Scheunenviertel was followed by visits to the German Historical Museum and a behind-thescenes tour of the Olympic Stadium. Our final visit of the day to Gleis 17, the memorial for more than 50,000 Jews of Berlin who were deported by the Gestapo and SS, moved us all.

Even with the help of a coach on our last day, the scale of the

sights at East Side Gallery, Treptower
Park Soviet War Memorial and Tempelhof Airport
ensured 90,000 steps were recorded over the
four days. Feet may have been sore but spirits
remained high as we flew back to the more
mundane environs of Manchester Airport.

The students were fantastic company and superb ambassadors for the school. I hope they will all want to return to one of Europe's great cities.



STUDENTS AND STAFF took time out to pay their respects to the fallen of World War One on the centenary of Armistice Day.

Willow Lodge pupils made a soldier and a horse in their art lessons and Junior School pupils created a cascading poppy display, using the bottoms of bottles and acrylic paint. The stunning result transformed the Junior School entrance into a wonderful and moving tribute.

In the Senior School, crosses commemorating each of the 58 Old King's Scholars killed in the war were placed around the school. Students attended special assemblies led by Mr Hartley, highlighting the incredible sacrifices made by the millions who lost their lives.

Our Design Technology Department enlisted the help of Sixth Form students to create acrylic poppies to be placed on the school gates. In addition, the school's flag was flown at halfmast throughout the weekend.

Headmaster George Hartley said, "Rohan was a wonderful, brave and highly gifted student  $who\ embodied\ the\ very\ best\ characteristics\ we$ would wish to see in a King's student. His loss has had a profound effect on everyone in the King's family. He always impressed me with his resilience, bravery and sheer determination to make the very best of himself."

Mr Hartley added that Rohan will always be remembered as an "outstanding student and first-class young man."

Speaking at Rohan's memorial, held at the school in November, Senior Deputy Head Dr Byrne said, "We knew Rohan in school to be an all-rounder. He loved music and was an accomplished drummer, pianist and trumpetplayer and he excelled at cricket.'

### **Master Cadet** completes award


CONGRATULATIONS TO Max Wood (KS) (L6DUT), who recently completed the prestigious Master Cadet Course at Frimley Park.



Subjects have included conservationist Dian Fossey, explorer Ernest Shackleton, Her Majesty The Queen, former president of South Africa Nelson Mandela, equal rights campaigner Martin Luther King and Captain Bill Bailey of the Lancashire regiment. Captain Bailey was Mr Hartley's great uncle who perished fighting in Syria during WWII at the age of 23.

Pupils have found the assemblies absorbing and thought-provoking.



# Science and industry comes alive

PUPILS FROM J1 ENJOYED AN EXCITING TRIP to the Manchester Science and Industry Museum, building upon the fabulous work that they have been completing in science this term, focussing on light and shadow.

Arriving at the museum, the children were wowed by the Revolution Manchester show, where they discovered Manchester's role as a nerve centre of the Industrial Revolution. They learnt about the amazing power of steam and how it powered cotton factories and transport on the world's first passenger and goods railway.



Following on from this, we took a look around the Power Hall. Once a railway transit shed, the Power Hall is now home to some of the original locomotives, rolling stock and a huge collection of engines.

The trip continued with a session in the hands-on experiment room, where the children were given the opportunity to stare into the mirror of infinity, create a tornado, measure their reactions against the speed of light and even watch their own skeleton ride a bicycle!

Class teacher Miss Ley said, "We loved seeing science in action and particularly enjoyed finding out how the power of gears could help us lift a Mini! The final activity of the day was to take part in the Wonder of Light science show which encouraged our pupils to question 'is it really magic? Or is it science?' Working scientifically, we looked at the different ways that light travels, the properties of reflection and how light interacts with the world.

The children were fully engaged in working out the secrets of a Pepper's Ghost magic trick, understanding that light doesn't just reflect: it can also pass through things and be absorbed. Sometimes, it does all three at once!"

WE WERE DELIGHTED to host an Association of Junior Independent Schools (AJIS) Cup Qualifying Tournament for the second consecutive year in September.


The qualifying tournaments are held at five different venues across the North West of England and are used as a stepping stone into the knockout phases of the prestigious U11 AJIS Cup.

career in the Royal Marines and his continued links to the school.

Sir James held various command and staff positions early on in his military career, before commanding 40 Commando of the Royal Marines. As a brigadier, he held two high-level staff posts – the first at the Ministry of Defence in London, as Director of NATO policy, and the second as the British liaison to the Pentagon, shortly after the September 11 attacks. This role involved assisting in planning operations in Afghanistan and early conceptual work for the invasion of Iraq.

In 2003, he led 3 Commando Brigade into Iraq as the invasion commenced and was the only British military leader to command US Forces since the Second World War – albeit for

96 hours. Which was the plan before the US marines moved north!

Jim's visit also provided a great opportunity to meet with 20 current Lower and Upper Sixth CCF cadets, who were awe-struck. He discussed his current civilian role, working for world-leading engineering firm Bechtel and how he felt that the skills and abilities gained throughout his military career, namely discipline, self-control and determination, were transferable and very valuable for a multitude of other careers.

As a fitting end to his visit Jim was asked to present CCF Cadet Max Wiid (KS) (L6DUT) with a certificate for completing the week-long Master Cadet Course at Frimley Park in Surrey – only opened up to CCF cadets this year.

THE BEGINNING OF THIS ACADEMIC YEAR marks the 20th anniversary

of girls officially joining The King's School. We are celebrating 20 Years of Girls at King's with a series of articles, profiles and speakers, culminating in a special event held at the school in Summer 2019.

Female students first joined King's in the Sixth Form in 1998, and quickly became a vital part of life at the school. By 2003, King's had become fully co-ed, welcoming girls from seven to 18 years of age. Then in 2015, our infants school, Willow Lodge, opened its doors.

Our students gain a great deal from hearing about the personal and professional experiences of recent alumni and in this special year of celebrations, we want to take the opportunity to highlight the achievements of the hundreds of girls who have now attended the school.

To kick-start the year, we caught up with Holly Anne Frances Marriott (née Miles) who joined King's Sixth Form in 1998, making her one of the first girls to have joined the school.

Whilst Holly was at King's, she studied English, History and Geography for A Level, which included many trips, contributing to some of Holly's most fond memories from King's.

Holly, an Early Years Leader and Reception Teacher, said, "I think 20 Years of Girl's at King's is such a lovely idea – slightly scary that it was 20 years ago though! We did really have a wonderful time in those two years when we were in the Sixth Form form and made life long memories."

### Q. What is your favourite memory from your time at King's?

A. Wonderful English lessons taught by some really inspiring teachers and a brilliant Geography field trip to Chamonix!

### Q. Did you have a favourite teacher? If so, who?

A. Mr Hargreaves. He was very inspirational and took us on some fab trips to Stratford to watch Shakespeare. Mr Priory was a great form tutor. All of the teachers were great.

### Q. How did it feel to be one of the first girls at King's?

Having come from an all-girls school it was quite a shock! It was a very fun and eventful two years though.

Q. What do you consider as the biggest challenge facing woman in the workplace and have you had to overcome any obstacles based on your gender within your career?

A. Working in primary education, I have to say that gender obstacles have not been an issue for me as it is quite a female dominated field.

### Q. What would be the best piece of advice you'd give to your younger self?

A. Enjoy the present and do not be so keen to go on to the next thing. Do not be fooled by appearances. Life is about your choices so much more than your ability!

MEMBERS OF THE KING'S SCHOOL ROWING CLUB became world record breakers after rowing a million metres in 17 hours, 20 minutes and 25 seconds.

On Friday 5 October, 38 girls and 50 boys broke the previous time for the High School U19 Million Metre Rowing Challenge (mixed). This was an incredible achievement for the club and the King's School Rowing community, who rowed the distance in memory of ex-oarsman and alumni Finn Abberton (OKS 2014), who sadly died in 2017.

The remarkable event also raised more than  $\pounds 3,000$  for F.A.I.R, a charity dedicated to funding research into the causes and treatment of auto-immune diseases, a cause supported by Finn. The determined rowers started the mammoth challenge at 6am

and, with the help of a team of supporters from the King's School Rowing Club Parents' Association (KSRPCA), finally finished victorious at 11.20pm.

Cakes, flapjacks and plenty of pasta and sandwiches helped to keep much-needed energy levels up as the rowers took it in turns to clock up the admirable distance.

Director of Rowing Mr Blackham said, "As a club we wanted to commemorate Finn's life, which was so sadly cut short in 2017.

Finn was a fine oarsman and young man, who rowed in the boys 1st VIII at King's for two seasons.

Rowing a million metres was a fantastic way to galvanise the club, parents, alumni and athletes. The athletes were fantastic on the day, breaking the record by almost an hour and raising, currently, a total in excess of £3,500 for F.A.I.R, a charity which was close to Finn's heart and will no doubt make a real difference to athletes in the future. It was a terrific day and one to remember for the club."

The money raised will be presented to Finn's family at the annual Pudding Races, held at the boathouse on Saturday 8 December.

Special thanks must go to Owen Parsonage (KS) (U6DUT), Oliver Irvine (KS) (U6FOX) and Jack Roberts (U6DUT) who were instrumental in organising the event and representatives from the KSRCPA for their fabulous support.

### HENLEY ROYAL REGATTA And International Regattas


