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
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# Positive move for mental fitness

TO HELP PROMOTE MENTAL FITNESS across the school, 16 Upper and Lower Sixth Form students have now been trained in mental health awareness by Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) England.

These Ambassadors have a number of responsibilities; however, the most crucial is to promote the idea of mental fitness and help other pupils find ways to embed these skills into their everyday life.

The Ambassadors have created a Wellbeing Space, where two of them are available to speak to every lunchtime for any students who would like to talk to their peers in a supportive and positive environment.

### Students support an array of charities

THIS TERM HAS SEEN a great deal of support for a wide variety of charities.

King's Rowing Club rowed and ran the distance of Boston's River Charles (129km) in 150 minutes to raise money for the Movement Centre, a charity which delivers specialist therapy and targeted training to help young service users gain better control of their movement.

Staff and some Sixth Form students grew their moustaches for Movember to fundraise for men's health, whilst other students created moustachethemed treats for a bake sale. Their role also includes being a visible presence around the school and promoting the principles of the programme via assemblies, whole school activities, poster campaigns and the parent portal.

The Ambassadors will undertake an audit of the school to establish what the student body and staff highlight as the main concerns and use this information to create objectives. They will also provide outreach talks to pupils and parents to promote mental fitness, and produce a newsletter to include stories, interviews and mental health activities whilst raising awareness of signs and symptoms of poor mental health and other related issues.

Students have worn yellow for the #HelloYellow campaign to raise awareness of World Mental Health Day, and supported the Teams4U Shoebox Appeal, a local charity who operate around the world changing the lives of deprived children and their communities, through supporting education and healthcare, providing aid and delivering shoeboxes.

To round off the Michaelmas Term, Christmas Jumper Day was a fabulously festive way to raise money for the Save the Children charity.

Some determined students achieved gold credit certificates last year, having earnt 30 credits in the first year of the new praise and rewards system. Each student can nominate a charity to receive a donation on behalf of King's.

The chosen King's As 1 charity is the Bren Project, a local charity who help and support people with autism and learning difficulties. Each House proposed a charity, and then the Head of School team, along with the Charity Prefects, had the very difficult task of choosing just one charity for the whole school to fundraise for in the following terms.



### **Empowering project** focuses on friendships

WE ARE DELIGHTED to announce the launch of Girls on Board at King's.

Girls on Board is a unique initiative that helps girls, their parents and their teachers to understand the complexities and dynamics of female friendships. The language, methods and ideas empower girls to solve their own friendship problems, recognising that they are usually the only ones who can.



Assistant Head of Pastoral, Mrs Sumner, the Heads of Houses and the Head of Removes are working with

girls in Removes and Shells to embed the main principles.

A representative from the national project said, "By empowering girls to find their own solutions, parents need worry less, schools can focus more on the curriculum and the girls learn more effectively – because they are happier. Over 120 schools have adopted the approach across the UK and are now supporting thousands of girls in their friendships."

The Removes group have already had their first session, where they were invited to talk openly about their friendships.





# Representing student voice

HEAD OF SIXTH FORM, Mr Josh Carter, has welcomed the new Head of School Team for this academic year.

Mia Hard af Segerstad Smith (U6GLA) and her two Deputies, Georgia Spender (U6GLA) and Max Williams (U6LES), took up their roles in September.

Mr Carter said, "The Head of School Team play a vital role both within the Sixth Form and as part of the wider school community. They are central to student voice within the school, and manage School Council meetings and meet regularly with the Headmaster and Head of Sixth Form. They support the assembly system and are key representatives for the school on public occasions."

Mia commented, "As the Head of School Team, we are most excited about the fact we can represent the voices of our peers, through the School Council, which we run, and also weekly meetings with Mr Hartley and Mr Carter, where we discuss the overall running of the school and get a great amount of input into any future developments.

"Every fortnight, we present an assembly to the whole school, whereby we can prioritise what we believe is important and share that with our peers. I think that's one of the best things about being Head of School, having so much input into the future of the school.

"At the moment, we are focusing on working closely with different teachers to improve the sustainability of the school, starting by plastic usage reduction in the Sixth Form. In terms of mental wellbeing, we really want to help everyone else to have a strong, integrated support system so that people know who to go to if they ever need help, so the new Mental Fitness Ambassadors (MFA) scheme will be greatly beneficial. To extend into the community, we are organising a Head of School event with the Heads of School in different sixth forms around Chester, so as to get involved with others outside of King's and share ideas."

FOLLOWING AN APPLICATION PROCESS and election, we are delighted to have an outstanding bunch of young adults as this year's Head Prefects (pictured above).

A SELECT TEAM of nine athletes from both the girls' and boys' squads travelled to Boston, Massachusetts to represent The King's School Rowing Club at the Head of the Charles Regatta. This event is one of the highlights of the American rowing calendar, with 11,320 rowers coming together to race in 2,295 boats across the 4,800 metre course.

Jack Ramsbottom (U6WAL), Max Wood (KS U6DUT), Gregor Montgomery (U6GRO) and myself represented the senior boys' squad, with Eve Jawara (U6DUT), Helena Barker (U6FOX), Eleanor Heritage (U6FOX) and Cecilia Varbiro (U6GRO) representing the senior girls squad. Both fours were coxed by Issy Donnachie (5DUT).

The girls finished 69th out of 85 crews, beating a number of strong crews including Dublin and Boston Latin schools. The girls felt that their pace was strong and consistent, with an excellent line being taken by Issy, who steered the four past two crews.

The boys finished 57th out of 85 crews with an impressive performance, finishing three seconds behind the crew representing Sir William Borlase from Marlow, Buckinghamshire. The boys beat crews from Long Island Rowing Club and St John's Prep amongst others. Both crews produced brilliant results for the club, representing the school against a highly competitive field from across the world. The event also featured OKS Harry Brightmore, who coxed the Oxford Brookes eight to a fourth place in the men's championship eight category.

## King's in the Capital – a great success

THE KING'S ALUMNI TEAM was delighted to host another successful London event on Thursday 21 November at the magnificent Oxford and Cambridge Club in Pall Mall.

120 former pupils from a range of professions and leaving years gathered together to enjoy catching up with friends, networking and learning about recent developments at the school. The evening began with a welcome drinks reception and a short speech from Headmaster George Hartley, followed by a selection of light bites and more drinks.

Anthony Fletcher (OKS 2000), CEO of Graze, then delivered an extremely interesting speech about the challenging early days at Graze in the UK and then about the company's launch in the United States. He discussed the logistical problems they faced and how they overcame them – with lots of data science and bunny rabbits!

Anthony explained how today, more than ever, societal demands drive business change, and that keeping up with those demands is a key focus for Graze; as he put it, "Society changes and you need to change with it." Examples he gave included Graze's commitment to cut 90% of plastic from their packaging and 50% of sugar from their products (which equates to three jelly beans for everyone on the planet!). The Headmaster closed the evening with a speech about his vision for King's over the next ten years.

### Nickolas Grace leads drama workshop for students

ACCLAIMED ACTOR Nickolas Grace (OKS 1962) visited King's to lead a drama workshop for Drama A Level, GCSE and LAMDA students.

The workshop began with a combined vocal and physical warm-up, and then moved on to various other exercises that Nickolas uses to relax the body and mind. Students then presented a monologue of their own choosing, and Nickolas provided useful feedback to each, to help enhance their performance.

### Busy season so far

ACROSS ALL AGE GROUPS, boys have played very close to 175 matches and tournaments, winning just about half of them.

The Removes have had a great start to the year. The fact that they avenged a 4-1 loss to Altrincham GSB with a 4-4 draw just before Christmas is evidence of their development.
