

Academic Success

Our 2020 A Level students secured places at top universities after achieving some outstanding results.

The year group excelled despite being unable to formally take their exams due to the coronavirus health crisis. A total of 31% of grades achieved were at A^* , 70% of all grades were at A^* /A and 93% at A^* -B.

In 2019, King's A Level results firmly placed us once again as the top performing school in Cheshire and top co-ed in the North. An incredible 65% of grades were A*/A, matching a record year in 2015.

Higher Education Advice

Unrivalled advice and help to get you into the university of your choice. In 2020, 80% of students gained a place in their first-choice university, with 94% gaining a place at either their first or second choice university. Of these, 79% will be studying at one of The Times top 30 universities.

Welcome from the Head of Sixth Form



The Sixth Form offers you the opportunity to take a greater level of control over your own learning, more freedom in how to use your own time and the facilities available to you and, most importantly, acts as the springboard between school and the world beyond. With competition for places at the leading universities being greater than ever now, it is vital that students give themselves the best chance of success by being the most attractive proposition they can be to universities, primarily through academic prowess and achievement, but also through the various skills that you will be able to develop during your time here and through the myriad of extracurricular opportunities offered to you.

The Sixth Form will be challenging if you are to get the most out of it but it should also be enjoyable as you challenge yourself to achieve the best you can in all you partake. Expectations will be high and you will need to be self-motivated – but that doesn't mean that help isn't at hand when it is needed. Tutors will see you on a daily basis, and remain with you during your time in the Sixth Form, acting as an adviser and a confidante – in short, they help to look after you through your time in the Sixth Form. The Sixth Form Day

The Sixth Form Day is three lessons during the morning, with assembly/tutor time after the third lesson, and two lessons in the afternoon. The school operates a two-week timetable and within each fortnightly cycle of 50 lessons ten lessons are assigned to each A level subject.

In addition, there is a compulsory games afternoon every Wednesday and there is also an afternoon of Enrichment Activities once a fortnight on Friday afternoons.

- Tutor period/assembly 12.10 12.35
- Lunchtime 12.35 13.50
- Period 4 13.50 14.45

- Each subject is taught for 10 periods per fortnight
- There is a compulsory games afternoon once a week
- There is a compulsory enrichment afternoon once a fortnight
- There are approximately 3 private study periods per fortnight in the Lower Sixth which increases to 13 per fortnight in the Upper Sixth (if a subject is dropped)

Sixth Form Study Practices

Sixth Form work requires students to organise their own time, plan in advance and start to develop the skills of independent study that they will require to be successful at university. There is a significant step in both the difficulty and the quantity of work set in the Sixth Form from that which students will have experienced at GCSE.

Students in the Sixth Form should expect to complete 12 hours of work per week outside of class (3 hours per subject in Lower Sixth and 4 hours per subject in Upper Sixth):

- Homework tasks set by teaching staff
- · Revisiting and revising material already covered
- Reading around the subject (e.g. texts, journals, newspaper articles)

A range of concerts take place throughout the year, both in school and at other venues. The main school concert towards the end of each term aims to celebrate the tremendous variety of music offered.

- Regular master classes with top professional musicians, from BBC Philharmonic, Halle and Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra
- The school competes in a number of local and national music competitions

It is possible to learn almost any instrument in the Music School on an individual basis, provided teachers have vacancies. Individual contracts are arranged between the teachers and parents and payment for lessons is a term in advance.

Drama

The Vanbrugh Theatre was opened in June 2011 and offers a hosts a challenging programme of work, both student and professional. Drama productions are frequent, some starring only Sixth Form students and others involving younger members of the school too. Focus Theatre Company is a Sixth Form only company, who perform on a yearly basis, often taking work up to Edinburgh's Fringe Festival. The Vanbrugh Theatre hosts the Drama Department's annual major production, which alternates yearly between a play and a musical. The Vanbrugh also produces an eclectic mix of professional productions, allowing students at King's the opportunity to witness work by some of the most cutting-edge theatre companies working in



the UK today. The Vanbrugh theatre is also used regularly by A Level and GCSE drama students to showcase their curriculum examination performances. The Drama Department runs yearly theatre residentials to London as well as numerous theatre trips to Manchester, Chester, Mold and Liverpool.



Enrichment Programme



What is Enrichment? It is a broadening of the learning experience. Enrichment enhances the basic curriculum and allows it to be placed in the wider context of the world we live in. The aim of enrichment is to inculcate certain qualities of mind. These include problem solving, creative thinking, initiative and self-direction, discovery, higher order thinking skills, profound personal interests, self-acceptance, and the courage to make a difference.

Due to Covid-19 and the restrictions in place, unfortunately, Community Action courses cannot currently run. However, this is reviewed on a half termly basis. Pupils are undertaking MOOCs as a very useful temporary alternative to Community Action.



A Level Course Choices



At King's all students will study four subjects in the Lower Sixth. These will be examined internally at the end of the Lower Sixth year and students may decide to continue with four subjects in the Upper Sixth or to drop one subject at the start of the Upper Sixth. About a quarter of students at King's traditionally complete A Levels in four subjects.

A level classes are limited to a maximum of 15 pupils. A level courses will not run if only one student opts for a particular subject. A reduced timetable will be put in place if between 2 and 4 students opt for that subject.

A Broad Guide to University Course Requirements



Please note, this is intended as a rough guide to help you think about the A levels you might choose.

It is NOT intended as a comprehensive list and if you are seriously considering a specific course at this stage it is worth looking at university websites to see exactly what they require.

The time spent thinking and researching now could make all the difference to the potential to be accepted on a university course in the future – the wrong A levels, or combination, could preclude you from applying for some courses.

All universities will accept candidates holding three A Levels, some with less. None expect more than three and even Cambridge and Oxford prefer relevant work experience (or something else which shows enthusiasm for the subject) to a fourth subject.

Most universities now use GCSEs to filter candidates and, although not stated, the more competitive courses and universities will expect many grade 9,8 and 7 to have been attained.

Engineering	Maths and Physics A Levels. Further Maths recommended, especially Oxbridge. DT can be useful.
English	English Literature A Level. History and languages (ancient or modern) are good supporting subjects.
Geography	Geography A Level. One Science or Maths can be helpful.
History	A Level History required.
History of Art	History of Art beneficial although no specific subjects required. History and a language recommended for Cambridge.
Law	A Level foreign language required for International Law. Otherwise, no subjects specified, although at least one subject which involves use of language and/or essay writing is advised.
Mathematics	Mathematics A Level. For Oxbridge, Further Maths is highly desirable and Physics recommended.

Entry to the Sixth Form 2021

Entry Requirements

Admission to the Sixth Form is by interview and a minimum entry requirement of seven GCSEs, of which at least four need to be at grade 7 (A) or higher with three additional results at grade 6 (B.) Grades 7 (A) or above are required in the subjects that will be studied at A Level. Grade 8 (A*) is needed in GCSE Maths to study Further Maths at A level. Students are required to have a minimum of grade 4 (C) in both Maths and English Language. Pupils join both from King's Senior School and elsewhere: usually around 20-30 students join us from other schools.

Prospective students are invited for an interview on the Sixth Form interview day on Wednesday 9 December 2020. These interviews are academic but offer the opportunity to see if King's is the right place for the student. It will cover the subjects a student wishes to apply for as well as offering an opportunity to discuss extra-curricular and career ambitions. The Head of Sixth Form, Deputy Head (Academic), Assistant Head of Sixth Form or Headmaster conduct these interviews (with the Head of Modern Languages and Music also conducting subject specific interviews). Prospective students are required to submit their subject choices for A level along with the most recent reports from their current school. A reference and predicted grades will be requested from the prospective student's school before a final decision is made whether a place should be offered.

Questions you should ask yourself about Sixth Form Study

It is an important decision choosing A levels and where to study them. You should ask yourself:

- Does the school offer your subjects?
- Are there sufficient numbers studying in the subject to get specialist teachers?
- Are the classes small enough to get individual attention?
- Are the classes large enough to get interaction?
- What is the school's record of getting students to the university you may be interested in?
- Particularly for Oxford and Cambridge, does the school have specialist expert teachers to guide through extension papers and the admissions process?
- Does the school offer Extended Projects and an Enrichment Programme?

- Provisional A Level choices should be confirmed by 18 January 2021. Timetable blocks will be constructed from these provisional choices. Reconsideration of these choices at a later date may be subject to some limitations once the timetable blocks are confirmed.
- A Level courses will not run if only one student opts for a particular subject. A reduced timetable will be put in place if between 2 and 4 students opt for that subject.

Bursaries and Scholarships
